




THE ROAD SIGNS

In Italy at the entrance of a town there is a rectangular panel with the name of the town and at the exit there is the same panel with a red line barring it.

As the panels mark the limits of the communal territory, sometimes they come long before or long after the effective beginning or ending of town.





TYPE OF ROADS

Along the way you will find many types of roads; we have tried to maintain a certain distinction although the difference between them it is not always easy to define. However, it may be of help to know that to us: **Paved road or asphalt road** indicate the same type of road.

Unpaved road is most of the time a wide dirt road where cars can run.

Dirt road is a rougher unpaved road that is normally not passable by car.

Cobbled road is a road made of large flat stones.

Original pavement it is a stretch of Roman or Medieval road that remained unchanged through the centuries.

Trail, path - it can indicate anything from a narrow, rough dirt road to a grassy hardly visible path.



THE OFFICIAL SIGNAGE

Via Francigena

The "official" signs installed so far along the itinerary are of various types. In addition to the official trail signs, numerous other trail signs can be found along the route.


A metal road sign which is installed along the sections of the route where motor vehicles also pass.







Red-white signs with the black pilgrim symbol. Stickers are usually found on electricity poles but are present everywhere

Cippo (stone signs)

Cippi are the ideal solution for off-road routes.





You can also find **information signs** with details on the route and various insights.



Via di Francesco

The signage of the Via di Francesco is complete and safe along the entire route. In the Tuscan stretch, for now, you have to rely on the white-red CAI trail signs and the yellow Tau.

In Umbria, the **yellow-blue trail signs and the yellow Tau** appear, positioned with attention to the bidirectionality of the route, and the poles with signs of the same color. In Lazio the situation is similar to Umbria.




















THE OFFICIAL SIGNAGE

Via Ghibellina

The Via Ghibellina can be followed by following the signs with the orange arrow or the white and red signs.



Tips for navigating the Pilgrims ways

Look out for and follow the Pilgrims Ways signs and markings – In all their different forms they are useful, but not always there when you most need them.

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Know the order of towns, villages, and places you will be passing through and by before setting out for your day's walk – At least then if you get lost you can ask your way back on track.



Make use of water taps – the Pilgrims ways can be a hot and thirsty work. Fortunately, there are, occasionally, water taps on street corners, outside cemeteries and elsewhere on route to provide a welcome oasis.
